



New Keystone Service Coming in September

In September, Keystone Walk-In Care will open in the building being constructed at 830 Fifth Avenue. It will be staffed by board certified providers and will be open seven days a week and evenings - no appointment necessary!

The services of Keystone Walk-In Care will be available to anyone. For non-Keystone patients, we will send a discharge summary to their primary care provider. For our established Keystone Health patients, our integrated electronic health record system connects all of our providers to a single medical record, ensuring that the diagnostic and treatment decisions made during their Walk-In Care visit are immediately available to their Keystone Health primary and specialty care providers. In addition, Walk-In Care will have access to state-of-the-art laboratory and x-ray facilities.

When to use Keystone Walk-In Care:

Walk-in care is for when you need prompt medical attention for non-life threatening conditions, such as:

- Colds
- Flu symptoms
- Sore throat
- Cough or upper respiratory symptoms
- Ear or sinus pain
- Minor cuts and bruises
- Scrapes or minor cuts
- Lacerations
- Sprains
- Possible fractures
- Asthma
- Pediatric illnesses
- Abdominal pain
- Rash or hives
- Stings and bites
- Allergies
- Fevers
- Headaches
- Foreign object in eye or nose
- Urinary symptoms
- Work related injuries

Keystone Walk-In Care will also offer the following services:

- School/sports physicals
- Flu shots
- Immunizations
- Travel consultations

When to use the Emergency Room:

The emergency room is for sudden or unexpected medical conditions that could cause a person to suffer significant harm or die without prompt attention by a licensed medical professional. You should call 9-1-1 and seek emergency care for conditions such as:

- Chest pain (suspected heart attack or stroke)
- Amputation of limbs or deep wounds with severe bleeding
- Sudden confusion or difficulty speaking or breathing
- Sudden, severe headache
- Sudden weakness, dizziness or numbness
- Seizures
- Severe head injuries with loss of consciousness or new seizures
- Major burns involving the face or large areas of the body
- Vomiting blood
- Smoke or chemical inhalation
- Poisoning, overdoses and suicidal behavior
- Physical or sexual assault
- Pregnancy complications over 20 weeks including labor, bleeding, fluid leakage, decreased fetal movement

Update on Implementation of Electronic Health Records

In 2010 Keystone Health began implementing electronic health records (EHR) in its practices. An EHR is a computerized record of a patient's health information. To date, all practices except Franklin County Heart Center, Keystone Dental Care, and Keystone Farmworker Programs are using EHR. The next step in the process will be to install an upgrade to the software in June. Then we expect EHR to be implemented at Franklin County Heart Center in September.

Sixth Annual Autism Fair

Keystone Health's sixth annual Autism Awareness Fair will be held in September at the NHS Human Services Autism School, 2593 Philadelphia Ave. Chambersburg. Dr. Steve Flack, physician and medical director at Keystone Family Medicine, is the organizer of the event. The fair gives families of children with autism spectrum disorders (ASD) information about available services while their children get to enjoy a fun event where they are accepted and understood. Parents and expectant parents can learn about the wide-ranging signs and symptoms of ASD and the available resources so early detection and intervention can take place. In addition to the educational exhibits of about 40 service providers from Franklin, Fulton, and Cumberland Counties, experts will give presentations that include a question and answer period.
